85 snakes rescued in 24 days as Gurgaon sees rise in sightings, bites amid rains

Gurgaon.(Agency)
The city is seeing a sharp rise in both snake sightings and bites as monsoon rain has driven the reptiles out of their shelters. Areas like Palam Vihar and Dwarka Expressway have emerged as hotspots. Eighty-five snakes have been rescued from homes and buildings across the city this month so far. June had seen 55 such cases. At least half-a-dozen snakebite cases were reported this month. Wildlife divisional officer (Gurgaon) RK Jangra said, "During the monsoon, snake sightings tend to spike sharply and there are several reasons for that. First, heavy rains flood their natural shelters like burrows, tree hollows and crevices, forcing snakes to come out and search for drier ground. In this process, they often end up inside homes, sheds, or buildings purely by accident. The rainy season also brings out frogs, rodents and insects, which are common snake prey. So as their food becomes more active, so do they." The rescued snakes included spectacled cobras, common kraits, rat snakes and common wolf snakes, many of them venomous. Wildlife officials say these reptiles are cold-blooded and more active during the rainy season. Many of these snakes were found inside homes, garden pots, storerooms, construction

sites and parked vehicles. Wildlife teams have urged people not to panic or try to kill the snakes and instead call the rescue helpline for safe removal. Meanwhile, District surveillance officer Jai Prakash told TOI, "Most snakebite deaths in India happen not because treatment doesn't exist, but because it doesn't reach the patient in time or isn't administered properly." His comment comes in the wake of health department protocol for PHCs and CHCs, released on Thursday. With two more months of monsoon to go, health officials are advising residents to take simple precautions: wear shoes while walking outside, check bedding and clothing and keep living spaces clear of debris and rodents, which attract snakes. Wildlife rescuer Anil Gandas said, "With the rains, snakes are being flushed out of their natural shelters. They are not coming into homes to attack — they are just looking for dry ground and often end up where people are." "This is the time to procreate and secure a good location for winter. Snakes generally have four months to move around which is June to Sept," Gandas added. Some of these snakes are very poisonous and if they bite, as in the case of common krait, one can die between 15 minutes and one hour. Wildlife official



RK Jangra said, "We have a three-member team in Gurgaon and we are collecting data on what kind of snakes are sighted in which areas across the district. We are also identifying hotspots."

Humid weather increases snake activity, especially during the cooler hours of the evening and early morning. Overgrown vegetation and poor visibility during rains make it easier for snakes to go unnoticed, raising the chances of human encounters. It's not aggression that brings them closer — it's survival. Meanwhile, in response to the rise in snakebites, the health department on Thursday released a new protocol to guide primary and community health centres (PHCs and CHCs) on how to manage snakebite cases quickly and effectively. This is part of a broader push to reduce preventable deaths. The process begins the moment a patient walks in. Medical staffers are instructed to immediately stabilise the patient using the ABCDE approach: checking for airway blockage, breathing problems, circulatory issues, neurological symptoms (disability) and exposure to venom. The next step is to assess if the patient is stable or showing signs of envenomation — where venom has entered the bloodstream and begun affecting organs. Symptoms can vary. Locally, patients might show pain, swelling, blisters, oozing, or discolouration.

MSDE Hosts State-Level Workshop in Gujarat to Catalyze ITI Upgradation with Strong Industry Partnerships

By bringing industry on board as an equal partner, we are creating a new blueprint for vocational training that is demand-driven, forward-looking, and future-proof. Gujarat's leadership and commitment to this mission reflect the transformative potential of centre-state-industry collaboration." A key highlight of the workshop was



a comprehensive status update on Gujarat's preparedness for scheme implementation. The state department apprised the participants of the actions taken till now, including potential clusters and timelines for pilot rollout. Further sessions focused on strengthening industry partnerships for curriculum co-design, equipment modernization, CSR and funding collaborations, and

establishing measurable outcome metrics. The industry perspective session witnessed robust participation from leading companies, underscoring the importance of shared ownership in skill development. This was complemented by insights from ITI representatives on ground-level needs, infrastructure gaps, and training capacity enhancement. On 7th May 2025, the Union Cabinet

approved the National Scheme for ITI Upgradation, with an outlay of INR 60,000 crore over five years to upgrade 1,000 ITIs across the country. It aims to align vocational education with global quality standards, advanced pedagogy, and real industry needs. Funded through a tripartite model—₹30,000 crore from the Centre, ₹20,000 crore from States, and ₹10,000 crore from Industry (including CSR)—the scheme will modernize 1,000 ITIs, including 200 Hub ITIs with cutting-edge labs, innovation centres, and training-of-trainers (ToT) facilities, and 800 Spoke ITIs to ensure wider reach and quality parity. Additionally, five National Skill Training Institutes (NSTIs) will be upgraded to host National Centres of Excellence

(NCoEs) in collaboration with global partners, anchoring high-end skilling, curriculum innovation, and capacity building. The workshop was graced by Smt. Sonal Mishra, Additional Secretary; Dr. Vinod R. Rao, Principal Secretary, Labour, Skill Development and Employment Department, Government of Gujarat; Shri Nitin Sangwan, Director of Employment and Training, Government of Gujarat; Shri P Swaroop, Industries Commissioner; Smt. Praveena D K, Vice Chairman & CEO, Gujarat Industrial Development Corporation (GIDC); and Shri K J Rathod, Director, Skill Development & MD, GSDM. The workshop also witnessed the presence of other senior state government officials from DET, GSDM, RDSDE.

Noida airport's expansion likely to hit 17k families, 4.6k of them to lose land

Noida. (Agency)
The expansion of Noida International Airport is set to uproot more than 4,600 families and force the relocation of seven govt schools. A draft rehabilitation plan — released by the district administration on Wednesday — said more than 17,000 families were likely to be affected directly or indirectly by the acquisition of 1,857 hectares across 14 villages for the airport's third and fourth phases. According to a household survey conducted between May and June, most affected families are small-scale farmers or agricultural labourers, with 58% of them earning between Rs 50,000 and Rs 1 lakh annually. Only 4% earn more than Rs 5 lakh a year. The draft plan, prepared on the basis of the survey, said since a large part of the economy was dependent on farming and animal husbandry, the resettlement area should include the infrastructure like facilities for livestock. The district administration has earmarked 340 hectares near Jewar town — in Alawalpur, Mangaroli, Ahmedpur Chawroli, and Neemka Shahjahanpur — for rehabilitating the families, planning a new community with modern amenities. Plots ranging from 50 to 500sqm will be allocated to the villagers based on family size. Roads, drinking water, sewage systems, power connections, community halls, anganwadis, fair price shops, cremation grounds, and areas for cattle will form part of the new settlement, the plan specified.

The draft also introduced gender parity by recognising unmarried adult daughters as eligible claimants. Like sons in the families, they will also receive separate plots and financial assistance. For the 17,945 affected families in total, the package is likely to include a monthly subsistence allowance of Rs 3,000 for a year, Rs 50,000 as transport compensation, and an additional Rs 50,000 for SC/ST families. There will also be provisions for skill training and job preference in airport-related services for one member from each family. Discontent, however, appears to be brewing among a section of villagers. Only 1% of households in Neemka Shahjahanpur, 20% in Khwajpur, and 50% in Thora participated in the survey that preceded the draft plan, seeking better compensation and water security. Apart from households, seven govt schools will have to be relocated from Banwariwas, Kishorepur, Ramner, Neemka Shahjahanpur, Khwajpur, Thora, and Jewar Bangar.

According to the plan, land will be allotted to these schools at no cost at the new site, although no compensation will be given for the land currently occupied by them.

The draft plan is awaiting approval from the state govt. "Once approved, we'll publish the final scheme and formally declare the resettlement area."

Noida man loses Rs 2.9 crore in a stock trading fraud scheme

A Sector 36 resident was allegedly cheated out of nearly Rs. 2.9 crore in a cyber fraud. The scammers posed as stock traders from a Kolkata-based company. He registered a complaint with the Cyber Crime police, accusing two individuals named Keerti Saraf and Krishna Rath M, of cyber fraud, breach of trust, and investment fraud. They claimed to be wealth management gurus representing a company named "Abbott Wealth Management". They promised lucrative returns on investments, such as 15-30% profit within 24 hours, and convinced him to transfer substantial amounts of money to various bank accounts under the guise of legitimate investment schemes. The complainant said that the accused, particularly Saraf, spent a long time developing a personal relationship with him on WhatsApp. From April to June, he was repeatedly contacted by the accused, who made him transfer funds through RTGS to multiple accounts. The total amount transferred amounted to Rs 2.89 crore. They ultimately told him he had profits of Rs 35 lakh, but he did not see any of it. He further explained that after the initial payments, the accused demanded additional funds under various pretexts, including service charges, processing fees, and taxes. They also shared forged official documents from bodies such as SEBI to persuade him. Despite making all the payments, the complainant did not receive any returns or benefits from the investments. Instead, he realised that he was duped.

'Baron of Westarctica': Harshvardhan Jain a frequent flier to UK and Dubai; has 10 foreign bank accounts

The 'baron of Westarctica' was a globetrotter, having travelled abroad 200 times and visiting 30 countries, STF's investigation into the man who ran a fake embassy in Ghaziabad for nine years has found. Harshvardhan Jain, who bestowed on himself fictitious titles from obscure micronations, installed flags to make his Kavi Nagar bungalow the impression of an embassy and had cars with diplomatic number plates parked on the compound, was a frequent flier to the UK and Dubai. The STF has found 25 shell companies registered by Jain and 10 foreign bank accounts in his name. SP (Noida STF) Raj Kumar Mishra said Jain, during his stay at the UK, had come close to India-born Turkish businessman Ahsan Ali Syed, who was arrested in London on Nov 22, 2022, for perpetrating a million-dollar loan fraud between Sept 2010 and May 2011. You Can Also Check: Noida AQI | Weather in Noida | Bank Holidays in Noida | Public Holidays in Noida Syed, who was later extradited to Switzerland, was sentenced to six-and-a-half years in prison by a local court for fraud and fleeing after collecting brokerage money in the name of securing loans for 16 companies. "Together, Jain and Syed had registered several companies abroad, including State Trading Corporation Ltd and East India Company UK Ltd in the UK, Island General Trading Co LLC in the UAE, Indira Overseas Ltd in Mauritius and Cameron Ispat Sarl in Cameroon, Africa," the officer said
